EP Students Unravel Stereotypes in Fourth International Broadcast

Our fourth historic Empower Peace broadcast was held on June 6, 2006 between students in California and Lebanon

n June 6, 2006, the Empower Peace initiative branched out to a new venue, connecting students from Milikan Peace Academy in Long Beach, California, to their counterparts at Brummana High School in Brummana, Lebanon. On both sides, students were counting down the days until Summer vacation, all the while excited about the opportunity to interact with what they thought to be their complete opposites, but they would soon find out that this was far from the truth. The main focus of this 90-minute broadcast which commenced with a special message from former United States President Jimmy Carter was to address etiltural and racial stereotypes in an effort for both sides to better understand one another. The students set the foundation for this discussion by submitting day-in-the-life videos which offered a glimpse into an average school day on the other side of the world. Students from remote locations in New York and Massachusetts subsequently joined the discussion for a round robin question and answer session with the main schools in Lebanon and California. As the exchange continued, it became increasingly apparent from the exchange of comments and laughs that the youth had much more in common than they ever could have imagined. As if to put the icing on the cake, the students from BHS performed a cultural dance set which left the audience and

The broadcast also incorporated two special facilitators, both of Lebanese heritage. In California, Lebanese-American actress and political activist Kathy Nijimy; and in Lebanon, actress Zeina Deccache from the LBC (Lebanese Broadcasting Channel) lead the discussion in Brummana, where she also spoke about her upcoming trip to the US. Both women spoke about the importance of cultural exchanges such as Empower Peace, as well as the necessity of forums where kids of all ages can address issues such as racial and cultural discrimination. The broadcast was streamed live via the Internet where educators and students worldwide were able to benefit from the

live event.

Peace Talk with Nader Twal

hat perceptions did you have about the Empower Peace program prior to the broadcast? How have those feelings been validated or changed since the broadcast?

Prior to the broadcast, the only knowledge I had of Empower Peace was from their website. Understanding cultural differences is a very important ideal to think about when it comes to sharing the world we all live in, and I'm not sure that present day interaction between cultures takes into account the shaping of our youth and how that affects their thinking....when youth can share ideas and thoughts with one another through personal contact it gives young people the chance to learn about each other from first hand experience, and not just through text books. Watching them interact offers a window into the future of society. A program that helps bring so many youth of different cultures together is a tremendous accomplishment.

What do you believe was the most beneficial portion of the broadcast for the students?

It was amazing to see the reactions from the students when they realized they are in fact very similar and have so many things in common. Dating may be different, but dancing and other hobbies are almost identical. It might have seemed as though some of the English speaking Lebanese students had an advantage in speaking both languages, but there was no lacking of pride from either group when it came to representing themselves, school, and country.

As an educator, how do you believe young people can benefit from programs such as Empower Peace?

The bottom line is simple enough. The technology in today's world allows young people to interact like they never could before and they can use it as a tool and Nader language. Kids can message Picture each other on the computer and cell phone from thousands Here of miles away instantaneously. Technology has become essential for building bridges through personal interaction and brought the globe onto an even smaller scale. It's very powerful and essential to forging strong friendships to withstand the trials of the future.

In your opinion, what do you believe the benefit for other academic professionals is to become involved in the Empower Peace program?

One of the many positives out of Empower Peace is that it ensures a person changes and adapts with the world around them. It might be difficult to adapt with new technology, but if students and academic professionals are going to be successful there has to be understanding between them that education is more then textbooks and reciting facts. Shaping the future of tomorrow is one of the most important jobs there is and a great responsibility for educators.

How do you believe the overall broadcast went? Would you suggest any changes or new ideas for future broadcasts?

The broadcast was a raging success changing the hearts and minds of all those involved. The students even wore their t-shirts the rest of the day and wanted people to ask about what they had done. Some ideas for the future might be having a place for free dialogue and building accountability.

How would you describe Empower Peace to a colleague?

Empower Peace is the type of program that gives teachers the ability to do things they never thought possible. Linking academic classrooms to different cultures in the real world helps teachers grow and expand their ability. Empower Peace gives it a hands on feel through actual experience, teaching lessons not possible in the traditional classroom.

Do you have any additional comments?

Just a big thank you...we'd love to do this again! I'm not looking for a particular date, just looking for a marriage of ideals.
