This past August, 70 young women from all over the world joined together at Lesley University in Cambridge, MA for the first annual Women2Women International Leadership Conference. The conference was designed to offer a five-day intensive environment for young ladies between the ages of 16-22 to meet with, and learn from, established women professionals through a series of interactive workshops and keynote addresses. Additionally, the young ladies had the opportunity to learn from each other, as the girls represented a multitude of countries including Bahrain, Pakistan, Afghanistan, Palestine, Morocco, Jordan, Lebanon, Tunisia, Bangladesh, Canada and the United States.

### **Women2Women Home Stay Visit**

The week preceding the international conference, Empower Peace sponsored a five-day cultural exchange program for young women from Bahrain and Pakistan. The young women were paired with families in Stoneham and Foxboro, MA, all of which had teenage daughters that had participated in Empower Peace.

"Although I've been to the States before, I've never had a chance to actually live with an American family," said Dalal Sangoor from Bahrain. "The similarities between us, and the things we found in common enabled us to get along better than we had originally imagined."

During the exchange, the young women participated in various activities in the greater Boston area such as a VIP tour of Fenway Park and a whale watch in Plymouth, MA. The whale watch outing proved to be quite exciting for the Pakistani delegation who all admitted that the adventure who all stated that the adventure was their first time on a boat due to Pakistan's geographical placement. The group also spent a day touring historical Salem, MA, visiting the Peabody Essex and the Salem Witch Museums.

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
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# Women2Women International Leadership Conference

# Young Leaders Learn the Value of Conflict Resolution and Negotiation

The Women2Women Conference began with a special screening and discussion of "The Fire Next Time," a documentary that focused on the importance of conflict resolution. Over a stormy two-year period, "The Fire Next Time" followed a deeply divided group of Flathead Valley, Montana citizens caught in a web of conflicts intensified by rapid growth and the power of talk radio.

The film, hosted by Susan Hackley, the Director of the Program on Negotiation at Harvard Law School, underscored the importance of leadership, clear communication and conflict resolution. After viewing the film, the participants engaged in a lively discussion about the issues portrayed in the documentary and what community leaders could have done differently prevent the intense conflict that ensued.

The following day, Susan Hackley led another important discussion about the art of negotiation. Participants learned why negotiation is a core leadership skill and how they could be a better negotiator. The workshop included negotiation exercises and a discussion about the importance of preparation and process in negotiation and the ways in which



women succeed and fail as negotiators. 🗱

### Journalism Panel Covers War in the Middle East

In response to the need for dialogue about the fast changing media realm in the Middle East, participants of the Women2Women Conference participated in a multi-level media workshop at the Fletcher School at Tufts University. Simultaneously, conference attendees were connected with a panel of esteemed journalists and with a delegation of young women in Pakistan through video conferencing.



Facilitated by award-winning journalist Jane Christo, the media panel consisted of personalities representing the world over, from the BBC and GEO TV to the *Boston Globe*.

During the workshop, students engaged in an open dialogue with the media professionals about news coverage in the Middle East. Topics varied from how journalists select their individual stories to the important role that the media plays in the Middle East. \*\*



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### **Regional Conflict Plays Itself Out**

"Motherblood" was a short play performed by Saphira Linden and Susan Nisenbaum that highlighted the important role that communication and conflict resolution play in leadership development.





"Motherblood" is the story of two mothers, one Palestinian and the

other Israeli, both of whom have survived significant losses in the midst of the ongoing war in the region. The play quickly captured the attention of the audience and emotions ran high as the dialogue intensified. One conference participant originally from Gaza City commented that the performance was an accurate account of how an interaction between two similar women would generally take place. The conclusion of the play was left open to the audience. Audience members were asked to form groups and develop the final scene of the play. This interactive piece of the performance allowed participants to use their creativity and conflict resolution skills in developing the conclusion of the play. \*\*

In the afternoon, participants joined Senators Joan Menard and Diane



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#### **Peace Talk with Diane Caldwell**



Empower Peace sat down with Co-Chair of the Women2Women International Leadership Conference to gather her thoughts about Empower Peace and the Women2Women program.

Empower Peace (EP): What has been your impression of Empower Peace, specifically the Women2Women Conference?

Diane Caldwell (DC): I've been incredibly impressed with the fact that an organization is thinking about women, specifically young women, and trying to get them to understand the importance of education and leadership. You don't need to solve problems and conflicts with anger and war. That fact that we want to improve self-esteem (think "little engine that could") means these young ladies will be better off in the future.

EP: What benefits do you believe Empower Peace has for academic professionals and their students?

DC: Empower Peace allows students to engage in a broader range of thinking with much more diversity. It creates a place where students can better understand different cultures and see that there are other countries that exist in the world; things don't always revolve around the US. There are other countries making contributions and have many things in common, especially in arts and music.

EP: Why do you believe it is important for programs to address young women specifically?

DC: Even today young women live in a man's world. They need to know they can make a difference and that women who stay home and have children can still make changes. It begins with education and feeling good about yourself. Women have always had better listening abilities and are often able to makes changes with regard to the education process. It starts with teenagers and the age group being addressed at the conference.

EP: Why do you believe it is important to hold forums such as W2W with such a diverse group of participants? DC: There are many important reasons. It's critical for students to see commonalities among other students around the world. It's also important to see that leadership and commitment does work. Young adults need to understand about other countries and learn how to listen. Making connections means making a difference and helping build self esteem. \*
